Go Green

The next time you go grocery shopping bring your own bags (BYOB). Most stores give a discount of from 2 cents to 5 cents for each bag you bring.

It takes one 15 to 20 year old tree to make enough paper for 700 grocery bags. What about plastic? They are not biodegradable. Plastic bags often wind up in the ocean and kill marine animals that get tangled up in them or swallow them. Paper bags are biodegradable but are often made from virgin paper because manufacturers say, heavy loads require the long fibers in virgin pulp.

If every household in the US replaced just one roll of 180 sheet virgin fiber paper towels with 100% recycled paper towels, we could save 1.4 million trees, 3.7 million cubic feet of landfill space and 526 million gallons of water and prevent 89,400 pounds of pollution.

Every ton of paper or 220,000 sheets that is recycled saves approximately 17 trees. For scale, the average school tosses 38 tons of paper, the equivalent of 644 trees—each year, so purchasing post consumer recycled paper and making sure it gets recycled again can make a big difference.

Energy Saving Tips for your Holiday Lighting Displays

- Purchase new energy efficient lights. Miniature bulbs use less energy than larger bulbs; replace older lights with LEDs (Light Emitting Diodes). They are low energy users and have a long life.
- Be creative with displays by using fewer lights.
- Use a programmable timer to turn lighting displays on and off.
- ♦ Unplug lights when you leave home or go to bed.
- Use lights and extension cords that are approved by Underwriters Laboratories Inc. (UL) or other recognized testing organizations.
- Discard lights if they have any cracked sockets, loose wire connections or frayed wires.
- ♦ Don't overload electrical circuits.
- ♦ Extension cords used outdoors should be rated for outdoor use. Courtesy of NYSEG
